



For more than 70 years, SOS Children's Villages has provided hope and a brighter future for millions of children during the most extreme challenges of their lives, protecting them and their rights. Standing on the side of children remains our focus and of utmost importance to us today as it did then. Building families for children in need, helping them shape their own futures, and sharing in the development of their communities is our mission that SOS Canada has proudly supported since 1969.

2022 brought new challenges in already increasingly difficult times for vulnerable children and families. Despite these added and ongoing hardships, our community responded here in Canada and around the globe and we nearly doubled our impact reaching over 2.5 million people worldwide through our programs in over 130 countries and territories.

While our impact was almost twice as great, the need for our work was even greater. The effects of the pandemic continued as many overlapping crises emerged from violent conflicts, natural disasters, climate change, and record-high inflation. We responded to 25 crises in 31 countries last year, increasing our emergency response and humanitarian action over 600% to support nearly 1.4 million people including large-scale projects to combat the war in Ukraine, ongoing conflict in Ethiopia, drought in the Horn of Africa and floods in Pakistan.

We know that children are most at risk of being separated from or losing a parent or guardian during a crisis, forcing many to care for themselves, and their siblings, putting them in extreme danger. Thanks to you, we could be there to provide life-saving assistance for many of these children, ensuring access to quality education, primary health care, mental health and psychosocial support, and more so they could heal, grow and be reunited with family members whenever possible.

As the cost of living continued to skyrocket, the new and overlapping crises of 2022 pushed people further into poverty, but you joined us in standing on the side of children. Your support of our Family Strengthening Programs also allowed us to continue to provide food security, economic empowerment, child and family-friendly spaces, and positive parenting programs, enabling over 99,000 families to stay together and better care for their children. From our community fundraisers across Canada to our institutional and corporate donors like the Government of Canada and Transat – to everyone who supported us with their time, voice, expertise and more – we give our sincerest thanks for the positive impact you have made in the lives of children, families, and communities around the world. This annual report shows a small glimpse of what we've achieved together.

We have seen the impacts of conflicts, climate change and rising cost of living continue and the need for our work remains critical. Learning from and strengthening our programs to reach more people in need and improve child safeguarding is a top priority of our international federation's future.

We are forever inspired by our global community's resilience and compassion to work together in times of a crisis and to build better futures so that vulnerable children today and tomorrow have a chance to thrive.

In closing, we would also like to extend our deepest gratitude to SOS Canada's Past Chair of the Board of Directors, Alfred Page. For over a decade, Alfred has offered us his leadership and expertise, serving as Board Chair from 2019 to 2022, and we are honoured to have had his support.

WHAT WE DO

SOS Children's Villages envisions a world where every child grows up in a nurturing family with the love, respect, and security they need to thrive. We take a holistic child-centred approach to help children, families, and communities succeed in the long term. We strengthen families to prevent child abandonment, provide loving homes for children who lack parental care, educate and empower children to reach their full potential, and advocate for children's rights so their voices can be heard.

Protect Children:

We work to ensure that all children have a loving family environment and an opportunity to reach their full potential.

Advocate for Children's Rights:

We campaign with children to remove the barriers that prevent them from realizing their rights.

Boost Economic Empowerment:

We empower young people and parents through vocational and leadership training so they can break the cycle of poverty and become resilient.

Respond to Emergencies:

During disasters and emergencies, we support those most affected, focusing primarily on child protection and distributing life-saving aid to children and families.

Strengthen Families:

We keep families together through our Family Strengthening Programs, which help parents and their communities to protect and care for their children.

Increase Access to Education:

We provide quality education to children and young people and ensure schools are places where all students are safe and happy.

Ensure Health for All:

We support health facilities and train frontline health workers, so children and young people have access to mental and physical health care.

Standing on the Side of Children in the Face of Conflicts, Natural Disasters, Climate Change, and Record-High Inflation

For over 50 years, SOS Children's Villages Canada has helped make families and communities safer for vulnerable children while expanding access to quality education, primary health care, mental health and psychosocial support, and youth employment programming. In times of crisis, SOS Canada has responded with life-saving humanitarian assistance.

Despite the progress made in advancing children's rights, extreme conflicts, natural disasters, climate change, and record-high inflation have created unprecedented needs among the world's most vulnerable children and deeply eroded the capacity of families to adequately care for their children. Over 200 million children and youth are out of school and at risk of never returning, facing increased levels of violence, living in countries affected by protracted conflict and experiencing overlapping crises. We have all been impacted by the skyrocketing cost of living this past year, a crisis that has placed the greatest burden on families living in poverty who were already struggling to keep food on the table, forcing them to look for alternative care and support for their children. In response to these unprecedented needs, SOS Canada will take bold action to ensure more of the most vulnerable children can realize their rights to family, education, health, and protection.

We will work with our partners to learn and implement best practices, continually adapt to change, and ensure the greatest possible impact on the lives of those in our programs.

We will meaningfully engage with vulnerable children and youth, to ensure that our programs are guided by their needs and priorities, and to amplify their voices through advocating for their rights.

OUR GLOBAL REACH

Our impact nearly doubled in 2022 and together we achieved change for **2.55 million people in over 130 countries and territories.** Through our programs, we ensured that children in Canada and around the world were safe and healthy, and that families could thrive. Included here is a snapshot of some of our programs that Canadians have helped support.

CANADA

In 2022, SOS Children's Villages Canada co-chaired the Humanitarian Response Network (HRN) of Canada – a network of over 35 Canadian humanitarian organizations working collaboratively to support people affected by crises globally. We also provided HRN members a workshop on psychological first aid to better understand the personal effects of stress, trauma and crisis.

COLOMBIA

In partnership with Christadelphian Meal-a-Day Fund - Americas, we distributed over 72,000 nutritious meals to vulnerable Venezuelan migrant children in six SOS child-friendly spaces in La Guajira, in Colombia. The meals were locally procured from Venezuelan migrants who were supported in launching their catering businesses by SOS Children's Villages.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

To empower young people and increase their access to employment and decent work, SOS Children's Villages launched the YouthCan! project in the Dominican Republic. As a global partnership for youth employability, YouthCan! gives young people access to professional mentors, career guidance, soft skills training, work experience and more.

UKRAINE

As part of our humanitarian response to the conflict in Ukraine, we trained more than 700 frontline workers, including humanitarian aid workers, teachers, police officers, paramedics, and government officials, on psychosocial first aid and trauma-informed care.

PAKISTAN

After the devastating flooding in southern and north-western Pakistan, SOS launched a full-scale humanitarian response targeting 420,000 people with life-saving assistance including shelter, blankets, footwear, and solar lamps. Additionally, we delivered thousands of dry ration food packs, as well as WASH kits (water, sanitation, and hygiene) and medicine packages.

SOMALIA

We helped launch ambulatory services in hard-to-reach areas of Somalia's Balcad District to provide free life-saving health care services, especially for internally displaced pregnant women, newborns, and children. This is a critical service for women who face challenges during their pregnancy or childbirth and need specialized treatment or emergency care from skilled health professionals.

NAMIBIA

In Namibia we launched an Al-powered digital chatbot, Rafiki, which allows children, youth, and parents to access age-appropriate and contextually relevant information about mental health, child health and development, and child safeguarding. Since launch, Rafiki has been rolled out in Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Sierra Leone, and Somaliland.

SOUTH AFRICA

In partnership with Zip Zap Social Circus, we provided nearly 30 vulnerable children with a two-year social circus training program. Through over 40 workshops with professional coaches in a highclass training facility, the children's self-confidence, physical abilities, and social skills grew tremendously, equipping them with essential skills to achieve their full potential and overcome trauma.

Countries and territories where we work

ALTERNATIVE CARE

We will not stop until every child has a loving, safe environment where they can grow and thrive.

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE CARED FOR

All children have the right to grow up in a safe environment even when their own families cannot care for them. SOS Children's Villages works with communities and states to provide a loving and supportive family environment for children who need alternative care.

Our priority is to strengthen existing families so they can stay together. However, when this is not in the child's best interest or when there is no family to care for them, we offer a range of reliable care options, adapted to the local context, to best meet the individual needs of the child or young person.



SOS Family Care (Our SOS Village Model): For more than 70 years, we have been providing children with family-based care in SOS families. Children and young people are nurtured by a reliable caregiver – an SOS parent – while living in a supportive home and community.



Foster Care: Foster care differs from country to country, so our role changes too. In some cases, we provide support services to foster families, such as counselling or training, or we work with governments to implement quality foster care through sharing our expertise or assisting in the development and distribution of quality training materials.



Short-term Care: When children need temporary care – for example, in an emergency – we provide an environment that protects them from harm in our transit homes. If it is determined that it is in the child's best interest to return to their family of origin, we facilitate and support this process. If not, we work with child protection authorities to find the most appropriate care option.

HEALTH

Every child has the right to survive and thrive. Our medical teams are reducing child mortality and ensuring women and girls have access to essential health care.





We know that access to health care is an important right that cannot be ignored. However, access to comprehensive sexual and reproductive health services is currently being denied or restricted in many parts of the world. It is often young people, particularly adolescent girls, who are denied the right to these services because of traditional norms and other structural inequalities.

Access to sexual and reproductive health services gives young people and families information on family planning, gender-based violence, and sexually transmitted diseases. It also provides general health care that promotes gender equality and empowers girls and boys to make informed decisions. Our SOS Medical Centres and mobile outreach teams are providing reliable health services, such as adolescent-friendly sexual and reproductive health care, to ensure that young people can realize their right to be healthy and safe.

Every day, our SOS Medical Centres provide more than 1,500 medical treatments to children and their families. Our health programs have a special focus on maternal and child health, nutrition, mental health and psychosocial support, and sexual and reproductive health care.

EDUCATION

From early childhood education to post-secondary opportunities, we are ensuring children and young people can realize their right to quality education, despite conflict and crisis.

195,500 CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE LEARNING

Violent conflicts, natural disasters, and climate change are just a few of the crises affecting children's access to education around the world. Over 200 million children and youth are out of school and at risk of never returning. Millions more living in conflict-affected countries such as Ethiopia, Ukraine and Venezuela are faced with additional challenges that prevent them from accessing education altogether. At the same time, unprecedented numbers of families and children have been displaced globally by the impacts of climate change, such as rising floods, heat waves, storms, droughts, and wildfires.

Around the world, we run more than 530 educational programs, including SOS kindergartens, schools, and vocational training centres. In response to the overlapping and cumulative challenges of 2022, we fortified programs and curricula to reach more children in SOS Villages, local communities, and child-friendly spaces.

We know that children who do not finish their education can become trapped in a cycle of poverty. That is why we promote high-quality, child-centred education, invest in teachers, and support the improvement of schools.

From preschool through to post-secondary, our educational opportunities give children and young people a sense of hope and allow them to be active agents in their learning and development process.

ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT



With strong families, children and young people can get the care they need to thrive. We offer tailored support to strengthen vulnerable families, helping to keep them together.

99,300 STRENGTHENED FAMILIES

SOS Children's Villages has been a global leader in strengthening families and preventing child abandonment for more than 70 years. Every child needs someone to support them as they grow, but many parents face hardships that prevent them from providing proper care. The direct and indirect effects of extreme poverty can also deprive children of the care they need to thrive. With generous supporters like you, we create reliable, long-term economic solutions so families can stay together and beat poverty for good.

Economic empowerment helps children reach their full potential and advances gender equality and sustainable development. Our SOS Family Strengthening Program model enhances the employability of parents and caregivers through skills training, cash assistance, and support in establishing small businesses and finding decent work. We focus on the most vulnerable and marginalized families – predominately single female caregivers.

Boosting women's control over household income brings significant positive impacts for their families and communities. When women are empowered to fully participate in the economy, women's voices are heard and their children's access to school and health care improves. Through self-confidence and leadership skills training, we work with women so they can access better quality work and make their own business decisions. We also reduce other barriers that prevent women from entering the workforce, such as a lack of childcare options.

In 2022, we strengthened 99,300 families, reaching 512,500 children, youth, and adults with your support.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE

We work around the world to help children who are affected by conflict and disasters separated from their families, and who have had to flee their homes.

1,386,400 PEOPLE IN CRISIS REACHED

Protecting children in crisis is at the heart of what we do. In an emergency, children are always the most vulnerable. SOS Children's Villages helps children and families in emergencies get the support they need to survive and build resilience for years to come.

Since 1949, we have responded to more than 215

humanitarian situations around the world. We specialize in the protection and care of girls and boys, working with unaccompanied and separated children, reuniting families, and ensuring children receive the support they need to recover. To protect children and prevent family separation during humanitarian emergencies, our local teams and partners provide life-saving health, nutrition, clean water, shelter, and education to those who need it most.

In 2022, we stepped up our humanitarian efforts to aid more than **1,386,400** people in crisis and protect children and families against the impacts of extreme conflicts, climate change, and natural disasters.



In 2022, your generous support of our MAYDAY Fund helped provide immediate, life-saving aid to children and their families in Colombia, Ethiopia, Pakistan, and Ukraine.

Ukraine: Protecting Children and Families in Crisis



Since the onset of the war in Ukraine, children have borne the heaviest burden. Millions of lives have been torn apart by violence. Families have been separated. The schools, playgrounds, hospitals, grocery stores, and homes they depended on to feel safe have been damaged or destroyed.

A generation of Ukrainian children are having their most basic rights to education, health care and the needs of their families threatened or denied.

When the war began, SOS Children's Villages sprung into action to protect children and families and deliver vital humanitarian aid in Ukraine and neighbouring countries.

Our response focused on the urgent needs of the most vulnerable – including women, children and families fleeing hotspots, displaced children without parental care, injured or traumatized children, and children living with disabilities.

Through collaborative delivery with local partners, last year our emergency response programs provided protection and humanitarian assistance to over 284,000 people in Ukraine, including over 150,000 children.

We offered critical immediate assistance such as cash and vouchers, emergency evacuation, and distribution of hygiene, food, and newborn care kits, as well as ongoing support including health, mental health and psychosocial care, education, and women and child-friendly spaces.



- 9 emergency shelter facilities in Romania and Hungary, allowing over 5,800 people to access safe and dignified housing.
- Over 18,800 gender, age, and environmentally sensitive hygiene kits to people in transit.
- Over 19,500 with emergency food assistance.
- More than 770 newborn kits to help moms care for their babies.
- Over 2,800 children with the materials needed to return to school.
- Training for more than 700 people on psychosocial first aid and trauma-informed care.
- Over 12,300 multi-purpose cash grants and vouchers.



Providing shelter and essential items for children and families



For the families forced to flee their homes in search of safety, many ended up at temporary shelters, like government buildings, public spaces, schools, and sports stadiums. These temporary spaces are not set up to meet the unique needs of children and families and are often overcrowded and unsanitary.

In Romania and Hungary, we supported temporary shelter facilities, providing necessary care to Ukrainian refugees and creating safe spaces for children and people with disabilities.

Food and hygiene kits provided comfort and relief for children and families who were forced to leave their homes with very little.

For Ukrainians in transit, we helped distribute warm meals within refugee hubs and at train stations.

For many, the cash and vouchers assistance were a vital lifeline that helped displaced families pay for rent, food, health care, and other critical services. This allowed families to decide for themselves how they can best address their needs.

Keeping children safe and empowering families

"Pretty much everything is very challenging for them," says Annika, an emergency aid project coordinator for SOS Children's Villages. "They don't speak the language. They don't know this country. They don't know the customs. Often, they don't know where to get help." A focus of SOS Children's Villages' assistance has been on helping vulnerable women and children. Many mothers travelling alone with their children had to leave most of their belongings behind, putting them in a dangerous position with a lack of access to social services, essentials for their children, and a support network.

In times of crisis, our women and child-friendly spaces are key to keeping children and their caregivers safe and giving them a sense of normalcy. Children can access play therapy sessions and enjoy other fun activities in a safe environment while their mothers can consult with a psychologist and connect with other mothers over coffee.

The situation is especially dire for mothers travelling with newborn babies and living in shelters. Our newborn care kits contained the key items they needed from day 1 to 6 months of age, including diapers, clothing, toys, baby soap, and more.

Another challenge for children is the loss of schooling and the materials needed to rejoin online learning. With the support of Canadians, we also distributed tablets, headsets, and more to families so children can get back to learning and don't miss another year of school.




