



ECUADOR
In Esmeraldas, Ecuador, we opened a family and community centre focused on preventing escalating cases of domestic violence and child rights violations in the neighbourhood.

SENEGAL
We joined forces with PLAN, Save the Children, and World Vision to respond to the increased levels of violence, abuse, exploitation, and neglect children are facing due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

COLOMBIA
Our teams provided safe alternative family-based care and emergency assistance to 250 unaccompanied and separated children, displaced by the crisis in Venezuela.

ITALY
We set up a 24-hour mental health support line to help families cope with loneliness, stress, and anxiety from the pandemic.

GREECE
After a fire devastated the Moria refugee camp, our teams provided education to more than 2,250 refugee children and distributed diapers and formula to affected families with young children.

INDIA
In Trichur, our team helped establish a community kitchen to supply food to vulnerable families who were quarantined due to COVID-19.

INDONESIA
Through our YouthCan! Program, 150 young people participated in online sessions to build resilience in the age of COVID-19, and learn the importance of embracing failure and to continuously adapt.

MOZAMBIQUE
In partnership with the Ministry of Health, we conducted a mass COVID-19 awareness campaign using megaphones and local radio stations. In rural Seke, we trained 70 community health workers on COVID-19 prevention measures and distributed PPE and hygiene kits to 2,100 households.

RWANDA
We reached more than 700 children and young people through mental health support groups and community counselling sessions across Rwanda.

LEBANON
Young people, supported through our Youth Power program, launched the Go Green initiative to help students and caregivers learn how to recycle, take care of the environment, and achieve lasting change.

HEALTH

Every child has the right to survive and thrive. Our medical teams are reducing child mortality and ensuring women and girls have access to essential health care.

HEALTHY CHILDREN
AND PARENTS

We know that access to health care is an important right that cannot be ignored. However, access to comprehensive sexual and reproductive health services is currently being denied or restricted in many parts of the world. It is often young people, particularly adolescent girls, who are denied their right to these services because of harmful traditional norms and other structural inequalities.

Access to sexual and reproductive health services gives young people and families information on family planning, gender-based violence, and sexually transmitted diseases. It also provides general health care that promotes gender equality and empowers girls and boys to make informed decisions about their health and their future. Our SOS Medical Centres and mobile outreach teams are providing reliable health services, such as adolescent-friendly sexual and reproductive health care, to ensure that young people can realize their right to be healthy and safe.

Every day, our SOS Medical Centres around the world provide more than 1,650 medical treatments to children and their families. Our health programs have a special focus on maternal and child health, nutrition, mental health and psychosocial support, and sexual and reproductive health care.

Disrupted Health Services During COVID-19 in Somalia

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a devastating impact on health systems and access to essential services. In Somalia, where access to maternal and child health care was already poor before coronavirus hit, lockdown measures have made it even harder for pregnant and lactating women to see a doctor. Women and newborns are now more likely to die from pregnancy or childbirth complications since the pandemic began.

To ensure women and children have access to life-saving health care, SOS Children's Villages has scaled up its services at the SOS Mother and Child Hospital in Mogadishu, Somalia. Our teams have also established a dedicated COVID-19 treatment centre near the hospital to avoid overwhelming the health facility. The SOS Hospital is the second largest in the country, providing over 120,000 health services to vulnerable patients every year, including the safe delivery of more than 7,700 babies.

"Despite the crisis, we continue to provide our services to women. For many of them, this is a matter of life or death. Pandemic or not, children are being born," explained Dr. Saney, head of the maternity department at the SOS Mother and Child Hospital.

Thanks to the Ptarmigan Foundation, SOS Children's Villages was able to support vulnerable children and their mothers during the pandemic through the SOS Mother and Child Hospital and the establishment of two COVID-19 isolation and treatment centres. The foundation also helped to provide life-saving assistance to female-headed households, COVID-19 awareness-raising activities among vulnerable

communities, and the management of child protection cases.

"The staff and I here have dealt with war, terror, and poverty. In a way, we are almost fearless. But nothing could have prepared us for what is happening now. But we are committed to helping vulnerable families as best we can. So, we fight," said Dr. Mohamed Dakane, a medical director at the SOS Mother and Child Hospital.



EDUCATION



Through SOS Schools and virtual learning, we are ensuring children can access their right to quality education, despite a global pandemic.

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE LEARNING

COVID-19 has disrupted the education of an entire generation of children. At the peak of the first global lockdown, 1.6 billion students were out of school. SOS Children's Villages quickly adapted to ensure children still had access to a reliable source of quality education while schools were closed. We have distributed education materials and hosted virtual and innovative mobile classrooms, supporting 198,600 girls and boys in 2020.

Around the world, we run more than 610 educational programs so all children who grow up in an SOS Village or the local community can graduate and reach their full potential. We believe that the sooner children start receiving a quality education, the greater the impact it will have on their lives. That is why we promote child-centred education, invest in teachers, and support the improvement of schools.

From preschool through to post-secondary, our educational opportunities give children and young people a sense of hope and allow them to be active agents in their learning and development process.

Addressing the Root Causes of School Dropouts in Ethiopia

When Yohannes*' father died five years ago, he was forced to drop out of school to help care for his mother and three younger siblings. He looked for work in a nearby village in southern Ethiopia as his mother, Asnakech, could not work due to health complications from childbirth.

"I was angry at first that other children in my neighbourhood went to school and I did not. I continued working, hoping that a better day would come when I could continue my education," explained Yohannes.

His two younger sisters later dropped out of school to join him in earning money by collecting firewood and selling it at the local market. A coordinator from SOS Children's Villages' EduCare project visited the family after learning about their situation. Through EduCare's two intervention components – education

and care – the children returned to school, and Asnakech received medical care and the tools needed to return to work.

"The SOS team worked on my mindset," said Asnakech, who now runs her own shop and plans to open a cafe in her neighbourhood. "They trained me in parenting, child protection, family planning, nutrition, and entrepreneurship. Above all, SOS made me realize that I have the potential to prosper to the benefit of my children."

"Nowadays, my focus is on my education. I believe my dream to become a doctor will come true," said Yohannes. "I have seen many women suffer different kinds of health issues in this district, including my mother, and I want to help."

In Ethiopia, an estimated 26 million children have been impacted by COVID-19 school closures. When children do not go to school, early and forced marriages increase, sexual exploitation of girls and young women rises, and more children like Yohannes are subjected to child labour.

Our EduCare program addresses the root causes of why children drop out. We support out-of-school children and students at risk of not graduating to complete their education and help them reach their full potential. To ensure students receive a high-quality education, we provide teachers with training and support to enhance lesson plans. In 2020, we scaled up our EduCare project and reached more than 27,000 people, including 18,700 children.

The Power of Early Child Development

The early years (0-8) in a child's life lay the foundation for their future survival, growth, health, and well-being. Our preschool programs ensure that young children have proper nutrition, are cared for, and can play and learn. Our programs also play a vital role in gender equality and economic development, by empowering mothers to return to work while their children are learning in a safe environment. In 2020, SOS Children's Villages supported the early development of more than 27,000 young children through Early Childhood Development Centres and SOS Kindergartens.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE

We work around the world to help children who are caught up in conflict and disasters, separated from their families, and who have had to flee their homes.

PEOPLE IN CRISIS REACHED

Protecting children in crisis is at the heart of what we do. In an emergency, children are always the most vulnerable. SOS Children's Villages helps children and families in emergencies get the support they need to survive and build resilience for years to come.

Since 1949, we have responded to more than 160 humanitarian situations around the world. We specialize in the protection and care of girls and boys, working with unaccompanied and separated children, reuniting families, and ensuring children receive the support they need to recover. To protect children and prevent family separation during humanitarian emergencies, our local teams and partners provide life-saving health, nutrition, clean water, shelter, and education to those who need it most.

In 2020, we engaged in the most widespread emergency response in our 71-year history — responding to the coronavirus outbreak. We scaled up our humanitarian efforts in 2020 to provide reliable assistance to more than 240,000 people in crisis and protect children and families against the impacts of the pandemic.

Protecting Children on the Move

In recent years, over 4 million Venezuelans have fled their homes to seek refuge and a better life in neighbouring countries, like Colombia. Since the crisis began, our teams have been working to protect children on the move who are at heightened risk of malnutrition, physical violence, sexual exploitation, and forced recruitment by armed groups.

In 2020, we reached 39,800 migrants and refugees along the border of Colombia. Our emergency response program provides temporary shelter for vulnerable families and temporary family-based care for children who have been separated from their parents. Our teams provide physical and mental health support for children travelling alone while we locate their family members and arrange for reunification.

We also establish temporary learning spaces to provide non-formal education for migrant children and help them transition into the formal education system. Our Child-Friendly Spaces and Family Friendly Zones provide protection services for children and their families. Parents receive legal orientation on their migration process and information on how to keep their children safe and healthy on the road. Children have access to psychosocial support, snacks and games, and learn how to protect themselves from risks such as forced recruitment, child trafficking, sexual exploitation, or abuse.

Humanitarian Heroes: Lebanon Blast

In August 2020, a deadly blast shook the City of Beirut in Lebanon, wreaking havoc across the capital and leaving as many as 300,000 people homeless. One week after the blast, Lebanon was facing a health, food, and humanitarian crisis.

Carla works as a family strengthening coordinator with SOS Children's Villages in Lebanon. Your generosity meant Carla and our humanitarian teams were able to mobilize quickly to help families who lost everything.

"I saw damage that I cannot even describe," said Carla. "We try to stay with families as much as possible to make them feel supported. We're providing families with food, essential items, psychological support, and hygiene products to help families stay protected in these confusing times."

Thanks to Canadians who supported our Lebanon response, SOS Children's Villages provided reliable care to more than 400 people.

Being There for Families

"I know we will not return to normal. This virus came to change our lives and we are learning to live differently," said Fabiola, 25, from Mexico City. "But it is very difficult when you do not have a stable source of income."

By June 2020, Fabiola was one of more than 12 million people in Mexico who had lost their job to the COVID-19 pandemic. As a single mother to a three-year-old daughter with an underlining health condition, the pandemic has been especially difficult.

SOS Children's Villages has been a global leader in strengthening families and preventing child abandonment for more than 70 years. Every child needs someone to support and protect them as they grow, but many parents face hardships that prevent them from providing proper care. With generous supporters like you, we create reliable, long-term economic solutions so families can stay together and beat poverty for good.

Economic empowerment helps children reach their full potential and advances gender equality and sustainable development. Our SOS Family Strengthening Program model enhances the employability of parents and caregivers through skills training, cash assistance, and support in establishing small businesses and finding decent

work. We focus on the most vulnerable and marginalized families — predominately single female caregivers.

Boosting women's control over household income brings significant positive impacts for their families and communities. When women are empowered to fully participate in the economy, women's voices are heard and their children's access to school and health care improves. Through self-confidence and leadership skills training, we work with women so they can access better quality work and make their own business decisions. We also reduce other barriers that prevent women from entering the workforce, such as a lack of childcare options. In 2020, we strengthened more than 78,000 families, reaching 347,000 people with your support.

Youth Employability

In 2020, we provided employment and entrepreneurship training to 11,600 people. When young people have the right skills and resources, they can confidently take their first steps to an independent life. We empower youth, especially girls, to acquire the skills they need to transition into adulthood and the workplace. With our partners, young people have access to training and mentorship to help develop their knowledge, confidence, and resilience. Together, we create opportunities for children and young people to thrive.

"I use the little savings I have for my daughter's asthma medication. My priority is to cover this, but it is very difficult," said Fabiola. "My parents have always supported me, but now the situation is very difficult for everyone, you cannot ask another family member for help because we are all having a very hard time."

SOS Children's Villages provided Fabiola's family with nutrition assistance and support for her daughter's asthma medicine. Thanks

to our corporate partner EQ3, we empowered 150 vulnerable families like Fabiola's through individualized economic intervention, income-generating skills training, and other support services in Mexico.

"Even in times as difficult as the one we are all living through, people are willing to help others," said Fabiola.

ALTERNATIVE CARE

We will not stop until every child has a loving, safe environment where they can grow up and thrive.

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE CARED FOR

All children have the right to grow up in a safe environment even when their own family cannot care for them. SOS Children's Villages works with communities and states to provide a loving and supportive family environment for children who need alternative care.

Our priority is to strengthen existing families so they can stay together. However, when this is not in the child's best interest or when there is no family to care for them, we offer a range of reliable care options, adapted to the local context, to best meet the individual needs of the child or young person.

We provide and support a range of alternative care settings for children who have lost the care of their parents. In line with the UN Guidelines for the Alternative Care of Children, we support the following types of alternative care for children:



SOS FAMILY CARE (OUR SOS VILLAGE MODEL)

For more than 70 years, we have been providing children with family-based care in SOS families. Children and young people are nurtured by a reliable caregiver — an SOS parent — while living in a supportive home and community. Biological siblings generally stay together so that the emotional bond between them can remain and grow. We regularly assess each placement with the hope of reintegrating children back home with their families of origin where possible and appropriate. SOS caregivers receive ongoing training to best support the children coming into their care. Our goal is to create an environment where children can experience the value of strong, reliable relationships, which helps them in their personal development and their future relationships.



FOSTER CARE

Foster care differs from country to country, so our role changes too. In some cases, we provide support services to foster families, such as counselling or training, or we work with governments to implement quality foster care through sharing our expertise or assisting in the development and distribution of quality training materials. In some countries, such as in Canada, our SOS parents are registered foster parents.



SHORT-TERM CARE

Sometimes, for example, during family crises or in an emergency, children need temporary care. In our transit homes, we provide an environment that protects children from harm. If it is determined that it is in the child's best interest to return to their family of origin, we facilitate and carefully support this process. If not, we work with child protection authorities where applicable to find the most appropriate care option.



EMERGENCIES

During an emergency like a natural disaster or war, we make every effort to prevent the separation of children from their families by ensuring they have the tools they need to thrive and cope with the situation. When children are unaccompanied or separated from their families, we first and foremost ensure the children are safe and protected by providing them with temporary care and shelter while we work to reunify them with their families. When reunification is not possible, we work with relevant authorities to identify a suitable long-term care option.

Since 2009, SOS Children's Villages Canada and Transat have worked together to change the lives of children at risk. 
Through Their Eyes (TTE) Student Group, McGill University
